Thanks for the chance to be your guest speaker this evening its and its an honour.

My wifes family have lived on taradale road in Napier for decades so the district is a place my family has a connection to. Are you concerned about the way our freedoms and democracy is being undermined by stealth at present?

Do you feel we are being herded like sheep under the cover of Covid-19 towards more and more Central government control.

Some say It's time to push back as we in New Zealand are or expeople and the power rests with us, as is the responsibility to act to preserve democracy when things get out of hand.

For the record I have no desire or intention to become involved in central government politics as any form of candidate as I find the current wellington scene very distasteful.

Like me you will have seen that Government is now looking at yet another reform this time its local Government and it joins seven other reforms all targeted to be fully implace by the 1st of July 2024. Why the date why the haste?

Having read the He Paupua report many months ago and watching whats been said against whats actually happening,, its my observation that it'?s a foundation document for the current government who went to extreme lengths to ensure its contents remained unknown to vote is before the last elections.

Even its coalition partners were una vare of it being presented in draft to Minister Mahuta.

The report was commissioned by this government to create a pathway to implement the UN declaration on the rights for indigenous people (now referred to as first peoples) which was signed by john key in 2010.

The report received proposes separation of many services based on race. Thats already well under way with health services just one example.

It proposes co governance with iwi of all aspects of the management of resources and it seeks to have royalties paid to iwi for their use.

At present your Council appoints commissioners to a hearing panel.

local authorities are accessible to their community and democratically responsible for their control and utilisation of the assets;

assets owned by local authorities reflect investment by generations of ratepayers within their districts;

local authorities are in a fiduciary position vis-à?-vis their rate proper regard to the views of their communities.

Secondly, it appears to me that the Government'?s advice may have disregarded the general principles which require respect for property rights, and full compensation where such rights are removed.

Such compensation should be full and objectively assessed, determined if necessary by the courts or an independent adjudicator.

we have all noted the Government has underway a '?public information and education campaign''?.the dirty trout cartoon which cost 3.5 million dollars.

My question,,, is that campaign both fair and informative.

In particular, there should be acknowle ige ment of the fundamental role of local government,

The points above I have raised are consisted with the principles and provisions of the Local Government Act 2002 and the general law.

Local Government Measure

Iniquitous

The Government is pushing the Local Government Amendment Bill through Parliament this month. The bill will give the cabinet (in its role as the executive arm of government) the power to abolish local authorities, and to force them to amalgamate against their wishes.

Many well-run districts, such as Devonport, Glen Eden and Howick, the councils of which have given excellent service to their residents over many years, will be abolished. Even if 99 per cent of residents in a district oppose what the cabinet wants, their wishes will be over-ridden.

Local communities will have no status, no voice in decisions made, no vote and no appeal rights. The new powers conferred on the cabinet will be the most undemocratic and iniquitous in the country's history.

In treating local authorities so contemptuously, the Government is abandoning important principles that it has placed so much emphasis on at other times:

• Executive power procedures will be used improperly.

Open government will be discarded.

Democracy will be replaced by Government decree.

Citizens' rights of appeal to the High Court will be lost.

Government members seem to be unaware of the

keen supporters of local body reform are strongly opposed to the draconlan powers in the bill.

Decisions In Secret

The Prime Minister and his deputy have strongly opposed the expansion of executive power by previous Governments.

When the bill becomes law, order-in-council procedures will extend into new and unprecedented areas. Important local government restructuring and constitutional matters will be decided, not by Parliament, but by the cabinet, in secret.

The best authority on the dangers inherent in this misuse of power is the Deputy Prime Minister, Mr Palmer, who told Parliament on December 16, 1982:

"Parliament is supposed to be supreme. What the Government says in the bill is that Parliament should surrender that supremacy to the executive branch of the Government. That really is objectionable, and it does not require very much knowledge to see

Parliament to the Executive. That is a conscious denigration of Parliament...

"In pure unvarnished terms, that is the aim of the Government, to take power away from Parliament, and give it to itself. The Government may not want people to understand that, because it is very objectionable. The bill also shows another lamentable tendency of the Government, that is a refusal to accept court decisions that go against its wishes. It is repugnant that laws passed by Parliament can be wiped out by a stroke of the Governor-General's pen."

The decisions made by the Executive will affect the lives of all citizens and will have a direct bearing on the rights of local communities to run their own affairs. Despite this, the public will be denied access to meetings where decisions are to be made.

So much for the Government's promise to have more "open government."

Replaced By Decrees

Under the new laws, traditional democat c procedures for learning with local government reform will be replaced by Government democation of the control of t

The right of residents, and of the general public, to present yews on proposed changes, to vote on a fall annation schemes and appeal against decisions with which they disable eare to be taken aw y...

The Government is pushing ahead with these undemocratic measures despite its very strong commitment in its preelection manifesto to expand democracy and to give ordinary people a greater voice in running their own affairs. The heavy-handed policies to intervene in the affairs of local bodies contrasts sharply with the Government's non-interventionist policies in other areas of management.

Under present law, the decisions of the Local Government Commission, which was appointed by

ernment policies, could be challenged in the light Court on points of law and also where the principles of natural justice had been breached. The new bill takes away his right.

The cormission is a judicial log. It is bound to act impartially and without preconceived bias. Since the present Government assumed office the minister and the commission have revealed a marked bias eainst small local bodies and in favour of larger ones.

Contempt For Rights

Compelling evidence shows the principles of natural justice have been breached. For example, the commission has advised some local bodies of decisions made by it, even though the statutory procedures have not been followed.

Some have been told that they must negotiate an amolgamation with their neighbour, or they will be forced to do so. There has been a contempt for the statutory rights of local bodies and others.

The only way for the minister and his commission to avoid serious humillation in the High Court, for breaches of natural justice, was to enact laws abolishing the appeal rights of citizens and councils.

The real motivation behind the minister's moves to "fast-track" local body reform must be questioned. Was he afraid By FRED THOMAS, former Mayor of Takapuna, chairman of the Auckland Regional Authority and president of the Municipal Association.

losing his cabinet post? In the short term the minister may survive; in the longer term, he has done great harm to his party and to the Government.

Who is ever going to listen to today's leaders, in future, when they make promises of more democracy, more open government, and the protection of citizens' rights? They have forfeited public trust. The Local Government Bill discredits them completely.

cabinet will have unbridled power to put into place Labour's "Think Big" plans for local government. There is widespread belief that the Government wants larger units because it is easier for party politics to infiltrate large organisations than smaller ones.

Under the new law, the

The new "fast-track" procedures will eliminate debate on the advantages and disadvantages of big and small local bodies.

There is an assumption in high places that small local bodies are less efficient and less effective than larger ones. This is untrue. There is much evidence to show that many smaller councils have performed much better than their larger neighbours.

Amalgamation Unfair

Take, for example, the three small boroughs in West Auckland, which have better services, lower rates and lower loan indebtedness than their large neighbour. It would be grossly unfair for them to be forced into an amalgamation against their wishes.

Where economies of scale are achieved through size, they are usually offset by greater accountability in smaller authorities.

Critics love to accuse small councils of being narrow and parochial. It is strange, then, that Auckland's small councils got behind Aotea Centre, while the two largest authorities, Manukau and Waltemata Citles, refused to contribute.

There is a wealth of information to commend the performance of small local bodies and to condemn the performance of larger ones. By keeping such matters on a secret cabinet agenda, the Government is spared the embarrassment of having to prove that big really is beautiful.

Having seen the fast track used on local government, New Zealanders can now wait and see who will be next.

Overseas Experience

A similar plan for local body amalgamation has been rating across the Tasman in Australia. During a battle over ed amalgamations in Tasmania one Councillor, Mr. H.G. oks, from St. Leonards — one of the councils destined to be lgamated despite overwhelmingly voting against — published ecial four-page paper for his ratepayers, setting out a cogent ment for the survival of his council. Included was a summary vidence previously presented by the New South Wales Local ternment Association in a 1977 booklet. The following is inted with acknowledgement to Mr. Brooks:

"Amalgamation, or so-called rationalisation of municipal ndaries, is not a problem exclusive to Tasmania. It has been d, studied and discussed in many parts of Australia and the ld over many years. And almost everywhere it has been tried, results have been disastrous. Let's take a look at some of se results.

"In England and Wales, the Walker Local Government Act 972 recommended drastic reductions in the number of local norities. When the change was implemented in 1974, 1400 trate authorities were amalgamated to leave just 422. The neges have since been universally condemned.

"The distinguished English academic, Mr. L.J. Sharpe, a spent many years studying local government, summed up disillusionment of the British people four years after the nees were made. He wrote: 'Never perhaps in the modern era a structural change in British government become so unpops of quickly as the Walker Local Government Act of 1972. Let from Mr. Walker himself, it is hard to find anyone to ded it. For many, the Act is seen as the root of all the major blems now besetting local government, including overfing, over-spending and overtaxing as well as the actual functioning of the system itself. In short, the Walker Act ins to have been a gigantic and expensive error.

THE LAYFIELD REPORT

"The Layfield Report of 1976", Mr. Brooks article went "which summed up the findings of a committee of inquiry British Local Government finances, had this to say:

"'In April 1974, domestic ratepayers in England and es received the first rate demands from the newly constituted nicipal authorities. The demands contained an unprecended increase in the bill compared with previous years. This rease was 30% in most areas with some areas facing rises up 150%."

"In America, there are four times as many local authoriton a population basis as there are in Australia. The average nicipal region in America embraces 3,000 residents, where average in Australia is 16,400 (In New Zealand it is 7,000 ording to the Statistics Department).

"In Germany, official studies have set the most efficient al authority as a figure of 8,000 residents. In No way it is out 8,500; in Italy 6,500; in France about 1,30, and in gium about 16,000.

"The city of Adelaide, that is the area inside the belt of klands surrounding the city centre, has population of only 000 and yet it is run efficiently and the city council has two no desire to take over parts of an suburb cities which rond it.

"In an address to the American Political Science Associain Washington in 1977, Mr. Max Frenkel, of the Joint atre for Federal and Regional Studies in Switzerland, acluded that 'bigger government is more often then not re expensive government'.

"He pointed out that sine the amalgamantion reforms Britain, staff numbers had increased 10% in two years. Where re are cutbacks, it tends to be the services, not the staff, ich get the chop,' he said.

"There is little evidence, he said, to support the idea that undary changes to increase efficiency ever prove effective.

"Another expert who repeatedly warns against the belief it bigger is better is Dr. Michael Jones, senior lecturer in ministrative studies at the Canberra College of Advanced Education and the author of "Housing and Poverty in Australia", "The Australian Welfare State" and "Australian Local Government". He says: "The assumption that amalgamantions will produce economies of scale has been one of the crucial assumptions of almost all inquiries into local government in Australia". But again, he says, experience shows the reverse.

"On the same subject, "A History of Local Government". by Brian Keith Lucas and Peter Richards reports: 'Experience shows that these much publicised and expected economies simply did not appear. Neither did expected economies in staff. Instead staff increased, as did administration cost.'

"Even the 1961 report of a Select Conmittee of the House of Assembly in Tasmania had to admit Unfortunately, evidence does not uphold the argument that the bigger the municipality, the more efficient it becomes."

"Giving evidence to the West Austranan Royal Commission on metropolitan district boundaries Professor R.C. Gates, of the University of Queensland, had this to say: 'Beyond a threshold population of between to 000 and 20,000, value for money is inversely related to the side of the municipal unit.'" And we've received more than 120 coupons we ran with the story calling for amalgamation views. Not surprisingly, the vast majority of people want their city or borough to stay as it is. In which people want to amalgamate with neighbours. A breaked with of the response from each area is: Mt Roskill (49). If albert (8), Mt Eden (18). Onehunga (21) and One Tree Hill (28) There were 28 replies from One Tree Hill residents, 16 m people in the Garland Rd-Ferguson Ave area which came is together.

Of those who aren't happy with things the way they are, six from Mt Roskill and there was one each from Onehunga, Mt Eden and One Tree Hill. Their reasons for wanting a change included "There'd be less hangers-on (in the council)," and "Bigger is more efficient." And replies are still trickling in. We now plan to send the coupons to the Local Government Commission so it will have an indication (albeit relatively small) of how people in Central Auckland feel about amalgamation.

SUGGESTED ACTION PROGRAMME

It has been often said that the problem correctly stated is the problem already half solved. No effective action against the forced amalgamation programme is possible without first having a clear understanding of the issue.

We must begin with the basic appreciation that governments do not belong to Members of Parliament or Councillors. Parliamentarians and Councillors are representatives; their correct function is to RE-present the views of their constituents. All those believing in freedom know that the proper place of government, whether Local or Central, is as SERVANT, not MASTER.

The free society, which is the only type of society capable of offering long-term stability and an environment in which the individual can exercise his or her creativeness, is dependent on there being checks on the powers of government. "The tendency of all governments is to increase their own power," said Lord Bryce, and the history of government in the English-speaking world illustrates the vital need for built-in checks on government powers. Such checks exist to protect the liberties of the individual.

The very purpose of the small, local and decentralised municipal government is to enable many of the functions of government to be kept as close to the people as possible. The destruction of local government by amalgamation programmes

Binding Citizens Initiative and Referendum, commonly known as B.C.I.R., is a means of providing the electors with the ability to protect their rights, and safeguard themselves against undesired government actions. For this to be effective it is first necessary to have B.C.I.R. enshirned in law. To achieve this it will require enough honest politicians who are true representatives of their electorate and who will put their electorate before their party. Unfortunately, this will not be an easy task, because most politicians are members of a party which is controlled by a rew who are seeking power to control policy for their own ideological ends.

When a sufficient number of people realise that Parliament is not supreme, that Parliament does not rule by Divine Right, but that the people must bear the espensibility of making the final decisions with regard to the administration of their affairs, then and only then will the opportunity arise to protect their rights. B.C.I.R. is a means by which all contentious issues may be settled through the will of the people.

To put it as simply as possible it means that the people would have the right under the law to initiate a Referendum on a matter of importance.

First, a required number of signatures on a petition would be necessary. The number required could be about 5% of those enrolled at the most, although the most commonly agreed figure for New Zealand is 50,000 signatures, which is less than this percentage. Some other places in the world may vary from this but this would be sufficient to place some restraint on frivolous or vexatious petitions but not an insurmountable number in cases of genuine concern among the people.

Having obtained the signatures on the potition the Government would be required to hold a Referendum. To put it simply:

- 1. The people would have the right to inviate by petition and thus have a Binding Referendum held on the repeal of an existing law.
- 2. The people would have the right to initiate by petition and thus have a Binding Referendum to propose new legislation.
- 3. The people would have the light to initiate by petition and thus have a Binding Referendum on a law that has passed through Parliament in the normal way but that has not been enacted.

The law would provide that such petitions which meet the legal requirments, i.e. the prescribed number of signatures, would bind the Government to holding a Referendum.

There are arguments, without foundation, that it would not work, it would be too costly, there would be too many referendums, it would upset our "Parliamentary Democracy", etc. These are all red herrings by o ponents of B.C.I.R. who do not wish the people to have a say in their Government. What it would do, would be to put a measure of control of policy into the hands of the people. In addition, for the honest politicians, it would provide the opportunity to dismiss all the minority groups lot bying, and allow him to tell them to go and convince the electorate.

As for it working? Well it does, in varous forms in Switzerland, in over 20 States in the U.S.A. In he U.S.A. referendums are held in conjunction with the presidential election which keeps costs to a minimum. The estimate of costs in New Zealand although unsually quoted in millions, actually spread over the electorate relates to a few dollars per head. What price freedom? This is a small price to pay for the benefits that would accrue.

Here in New Zealand the Tauranga City Council has introduced a referendum law allowing citizens a say in their own affairs. It remains for other local authorities and central Government to follow. You can assist in achieving this by reminding your councillors and MP that they are your representative and you disire to have them introduce B.C.I.R.

......

Democracy is like good health, it is only after you have lost it that you fully appreciate it. The huge demonstrations and protest rallies in China and Eastern Europe prove my point.

Gradually over a period of many years we have let so called "experts" and academics take over decision making thinking they were working on our behalf. We have let it happen by default. It should be quite obvious to all that the Spirit of Democracy is dead and that we are only slightly better off than under Communist rule. The way the present Government has been able to railroad policy through Parliament against the wish of the vast majority of New Zealanders and even their own Labour Party should ring warning bells.

To say we have Democracy in New Zealand Government is a laugh, but unfortunately very few people understand how the "Party" system has hijacked Democracy and centralized power for itself. With a "Party" system the elected Member of Parliament signs allegiance to his party, not to the voter. Mel Courtney and Jim Anderton are examples of what happens if they do not comform to the Party. The "Party" system can be manipulated and controlled by a handful in Cabinet, as the Television Documentary showed some time ago on how Rogernomics took control.

As a permanent reminder to all New Zealanders the early settlers of Christchurch enshrined a number of wise precepts in the stained-glass windows of the old Canterbury Provincial Buildings. One reads "Party is the madness of the many for the gain of the few"

Many people believe that changing Labour for National is the answer but they would be sadly mistaken as the past proves. Others believe Proportional Representation is the answer to Prairier system, but stop and think, it is based on the "Party" system of contralized power. It also does nothing to control the influence of the not-elected officials, advisors and pressure groups which dictate Policy no matter which Party is in power.

The only system giving the voter a real say in decision making is the Swiss system of Referendim and Recall. It works in three parts:-

Voters Veto - Voters right to veto existing or proposed Laws of Central or Local Government.

Initiative - Voters have power to introduce new Laws.

Right of Public Office.

Voters right to dismiss officials holding Public Office.

Voters can through a petition mandatory require the Government to hold a Referendum on a particular issue. Every New Zealander over 18 years has a vote on the issue and the Referendum result is binding on Govt.

If you believe in Democracy and a fairer system it will require effort from each and everyone of us. First of all be informed and understand "Democracy" and the different voting systems. It is worth fighting for, let us not sacrifice the pain and suffering of two World Wars.

Freedom is passed on to the next generation better than we received it.



The Good, the Bad and the Ugly

Over the years I have met, had lunch, dinner, drinks of pleetings with a vast number of politicians. Some were great, most were average, but none, with one exception were evil.

I grew up in a political family. We had carrinet ministers and prime ministers over for dinner. My mother never really liked most of them, and I got my healthy district of politicians from her. I remember one night her telling Aussie Malcolm chapter and verse why he way going to be unemployed after the next election...?and she was right, he was.



I remember the night Jim Bolger was sitting in front of Mum'?s grand piano, sipping a scotch, while Winston Peters was regaling others with stories while he stretched his arm across the mantlepiece, a fag in one hand and a Scotch in the other, warming his backside by the fire. Bolger was telling me, and a couple of others who were there, all about how Jim McLay was a really nice guy, but sadly nice guys finish last. Two weeks later Jim Bolger was knifing McLay to become the leader of the opposition, and then Prime Minister. Jim Bolger was even invited to my wedding, and I'?ve still got the letter he wrote back then.



It was my father who was asked, by the cowards in caucus, to meet Jim Bolger at the airport to tell him there had been a coup while he was overseas, and that when he got back to Wellington the numbers had been done and Jenny Shipley was going to replace him.

I remember Jenny Shipley coming to my sister'?s birthday dinner at a restaurant in Newmarket. I can remember Maurice Williamson leaping on stage and grabbing an electric guitar to play at my sister'?s 21st.

I once went to Maurice'?s house in Epsom to spend a long afternoon playing loads of Deep Purple, The Who and other great music at volumes

that left us both deaf. So much so we never heard the neighbours pounding on the door.

I can remember my grandmother telling assorted ministers visiting us at the beach house her ideas on health care and hospitals, and those being implemented.

I can fondly remember the smell of cigar smoke wafting down the hallway of Vogel House to my room from the lounge where Doug Graham was reading the newspaper at six in the morning.

I was in the whip'?s office and helped draft the caucus resolution that threw Winston Peters out of caucus, and I remember well Bill Birch (another MP I respect deeply) coming down to read the resolution before going to income Bolger of what was about to happen. Those really were the days of smoke filled rooms, especially when chair smoking Doug Kidd and cigar smoking Doug Graham were in the room.

I was standing beside Maurice Williamson when he was filmed after the 2002 election debacle and uttered his now infamous comment about needing to <u>lance the boil within the party</u>. That particular boil took pearly 20 years to get lanced properly.

I'?ve been there and seen it all, up close and personal.

When it comes to Prime Ministers, I'?ve met Robert Muldoon, David Lange, Jim Bolger, Jenny Shipley, Helen Clark, John Key, Bill English and Jacinda Ardern. I think that in the current press galler, only Barry Soper can claim a similar pedigree. Hell'?s teeth, I can remember Barry when he had hair and was vis ting Dad'?s place.

In 2008, I even had lunch with Jacinda Ardern over three hours in Morrinsville. If now she remembers it because when David Cunliffe was Labour'?s leader and they were planning the Dirty Policies nit job, the members of the Labour caucus were asked if any of them had dealings with me. Jacinda Ardern, to the credit, owned up about the lunch. Stuart Nash skulked at the back and said nothing.

Politicians, by their very nature, are narcissistic, self absorbed and so iopaths. Very few of them have any compassion and those that do keep it quiet. To give you an example, when I had my stroke just one National MP bothered to come see me, and tipped up at the hospital even. No other National MP collect, emailed or even sent a card. Only that one, very compassionate, and deeply misunderstood MP. Only one Labou MP bothered to message me. No, it wasn'?t Stuart Nash. It was another, and his text messages to me later one night were a treasure. He knows who he is, and I appreciated those texts and those sentiments as they were heartful and compassionate.

Politics is a blood sport, but I believe always that we need to get past tribalism and polarisation in politics, and we very desperately need compassionate people in politics.

There are very few politicians who I respect; there are none, with the exception of one, who I despise. Helen Clark was a brilliant politician. I didn'?t agree with her politics and still don'?t,

but she is one politician I can respect, for her immense will power, her stickability and her political skills. She fought to the very end. I have no respect for John Key. He thought he could sway a referendum on the flag, I old him he was wrong and would lose. It turned out I was right and he was wrong. That was the beginning of the coll of tim; he realised that he could no longer walk on water. But he also lacked courage; any man who rings and her man'?s father to pass on a message is gutless and beneath contempt. He bolted when he thought he couldn'?t win again, and left us with Bill English, a staid and dependable Finance Minister but someone who has tits for ands when it came to leadership.

Most politicians enter politics stating all sorts of altruistic reasons why they entered parliament. Mostly they are lies, mouthing pithy sentiment; tosh about making the world a better place. Parliament'?s history is littered with MPs'? careers that achieved little other than enriching themselves at the taxpayers'? expense.



Despite all their foibles I sincerely believe that most are not evil: misguided maybe, but not evil. Not even Robert Muldoon was evil, but he was surely misguided. He tried his best when faced with economic doom and oil shocks. He was ill-equipped to handle the various crises that beset his government, but ironically the very power systems and energy self sufficiency we now enjoy —? and our great renewable energy that the climate change advocates bang on about —? were a result of Muldoon'?s and Bill Birch'?s foresight with Think Big. The very projects that Labour and others vociferously opposed.

When I had that three hour lunch with her I came away thinking that this woman makes a lot of sound and thinks she sounds informed and interested about the world and politics. But on reflection, at the time, I said to David Farrar, who was also there, that she was just mouthing slogans and platitudes. Bumper sticker slogans and rehearsed lines. There was no depth there, and there still isn'?t.



She is my exception, the one I believe is actually evil, and here is why I believe that.

She is fake, more fake than a \$10 copy watch bourn, in the back alleys of Hong Kong. She has claimed many, many things, like all politicians, about why she entered politics. She professes wanting to end child poverty; she eran made herself the minister in charge of ending child poverty. The also claimed that climate change was her generation? Success for her entering politics she has failed mass rely and comprehensively. All the child poverty statistics are either materially worse or have barely budged. Her climate change commitments are

joke. She wrecked an industry on a Captain'?s Call and then presided over the largest imports of coal we have ever seen, into a country that is sitting on huge coal reserves. Every single signature election promise has been an abject failure. She told people she was going to make houses more affordable; their cost have more than doubled. She promised to build 100,000 Kiwibuild homes, but it turned out that she couldn'?t build shouse in a room full of Lego. She promised light rail to the airport and has failed to lay even a single centimet e of track. None of those things are evil, but they are all dishonest and show a predilection towards failure after bold promises.

She told us that she never lies, which was a lie. But since taking power she has grabbed unprecedented additional powers, more so than even Robert Muldoon. With that power she locked up, removed our freedoms and told us all it was for our health. Never before in the history of the world have so many healthy people been locked up and had their freedoms taken away, all on the pretext of protecting our health.





If government wanted to send a message that you shouldn't bother coming to the Coast over summer, then they'd be hard-pressed to find better ways than cancelling all Tranzalpine services. Since COVID began, have you seen any concerted effort by Tranzalpine to target domestic travellers and dramatically increase the number of New Zealanders holidaying on the West Coast? Me neither. That's what government expects from all privately-owned tourism businesses, however.



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
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West Coast Tourism Investment Package Cabinet Paper

I seek Cabinet agreement to the following five tourism proposals, as two are over \$20 million and with the other three comprise a significant package for the West Coast:

2? Provincial Rail Growth (\$80m capital injection): The project will provide a strong tourism offering for the West Coast and other parts of the South Island such as Kaikoura. It will fund new and refurbished train carriages, platform upgrades, a new reservation system, international marketing, and year round premium carriages on the TranzAlpine and Coastal Pacific services.



The Government'?s \$40m investment in the award-winning TranzAlpine scenic trainvill bring thousands more tourists onto the West Coast each year, creating jobs and enabling other tourism ventures, Kiv Rail Acting Chief Executive Todd Moyle says.

The investment, announced by Regional Economic Development Minister Shane Jones today, includes adding a further two passenger carriages and a new premium service to the train, which links with the Coastal Pacific'?s premium service announced last week.

"?The TranzAlpine already makes a significant contribution to the West Coast economy, bringing 82,000 passengers into Greymouth each year which supports around 400 local jobs,"? Mr. Veyle says.

"?Over the summer peak the service is often booked out, so Go enment support to add two more 63-seat carriages and introduce a new premium carriage is great news for the West Coast.

"?The new premium services on the TranzAlpine, and Coastal Pacific which will offer more space and high-quality food and beverages to go along with the world-renowned scenery, will allow us to tap into the fast growing, international high-value travel market, and deliver ever more benefits for the West Coast.

"?KiwiRail will also be working with tourism agencies and operators on the West Coast to develop itineraries that connect TranzAlpine passengers with other tourism experiences and accommodation.

"?Other Provincial Growth Fund initiatives announced today, such as the development at Punakaiki, are the kind of tourism projects that could make the most of visitors coming into Greymouth on the TranzAlpine,"? Mr Moyle says.



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the launch of clinical trials around the world. We are moving swiftly but without taking any short cuts or compromising safety. Vaccine companies have been sharing their data all over the world, which has specific the research process and led to a number of innovations, such as the use of the messenger RNA technology. The agenties that regulate vaccines, like New Zealand'?s Medsafe, have been able to start assessing the clinical trial data much sooner than they normally would. Large manufacturing plants have been developed, enabling vaccines to be produced more swiftly and on a larger scale than previously possible. We will also continue to receive data from large, ongoing linical trials, enabling us to monitor the safety and effectiveness of the vaccines right through the initial roll-out and not otheir ongoing use. All these changes mean that safety approvals that used to take a long time have happened faster. There have been no shortcuts. Is the vaccine effective against new strains of the virus? The Ministry of Health is evaluating preliminary data from other countries about the impact new strains may have on vaccine effectiveness. Vaccination remains our key defence against all viriants of COVID-19, including Omicron. We continue to ask everyone who is eligible to get vaccinated, including people who are now eligible for a booster dose.

In the past 24 hours, 10,703 booster doses (orevious day: 21,821 doses) were given.

A total of 500,821 booster doses have row been given since they became available in late November 2021, representing more than 35% of those who are currently eligible.

Boosters are strongly recommerced for anyone over 18 who has had their second dose at least 4 months ago.

From **17 January 2022**, an one who has had their second dose more than 4 months ago can book a booster at <u>BookMyVaccine.nz</u>. Many clinics are accepting walk-ins for boosters right now. You can also book currently by calling the COVID Vaccination Healthline transport 0800 28 29 26.

We are reporting new control unity cases in Auckland, Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Lakes and Wellington. We are also reporting two cases in Hawke'?s Bay, as cudined below. They tested positive in Waikato but have Hawke'?s Bay addresses. We are also reporting one case in Northland today which will officially be added to tomorrow'?s numbers.

Auckland metro vaccination update

Northland

Auckland

There are 16 cases to report in Auckland today.

Health and welfare providers are now supporting 944 people in the region to isolate at home, including 204 cases.

Waikato

There are five new cases in the Waikato today, three are unlinked.

Two are in Hamilton, one in Ngā?ruawā?hia_one in Whitianga, one in Coromandel town.

Pop-up testing sites are operating in Whar gamatā? and testing is available at general practices in Whangamatā?, Whitianga and Te Awamutu by appointment. In the Waikato, Public Health, primary care and manaaki providers are supporting 36 cases to isolate at home.

Bay of Plenty

There are two cases to report in the Western Bay of Plenty today.

One of today'?s case's a household previously reported cases, and one is still being investigated for potential links.

Both cases are isolating at home.

At this stage, no further positive COVID-19 test results have been received associated with the drum and bass festival in Tauranga'?s Wharepai Domain on 3 January which had been attended by a person with COVID-19.

All those who attended the festival should monitor for symptoms and get tested if any symptoms develop, no matter how mild.

No further cases have been linked to the festival and the initial test results of the 11 close contacts of the Wellington case are all negative.

Lakes

There is one case to report in Rotorua today.

The case is still being investigated for links to previously reported cases.

**Hawke'?s Bay

There are two Hawke'?s Bay residents who have tested positive while in Waikato.

Both cases are previously linked to reported cases in Waikato.

Both cases are currently isolating in Te Kū?iti. There are no known exposure events associated with these cases in Hawke'?s Bay.

Wellington

There is one new case to report in Wellington.

The case attended the Britomart Block Party in Auckland on New Year'?s Eve.

Anyone who attended this event between 11.15pm on 31 December and 2.30am on 1 January are advised to immediately get tested then self-monitor for COVID-19 symptoms for 11 days after you were exposed. If you have symptoms get tested, stay home until you receive a negative test result.

The case is in isolation and, at this stage, no associated locations of interest have been identified in the Wellington region. Locations of interest for other Wellington cases are published in the Ministry website and we encourage people to check these and follow the instructions for symptoms and testing.
