The initial intervention is undertaken by investigation and then classified as per the Act. Annually each classified dog is checked to ensure that the owners are compliant with the classification, this includes checking on fencing, dog welfare and meeting with the owner to reinforce classification requirements.

5. Among all the possible consequences for the dog owner following an attack, please list how many of each of those were taken, annually and by month (please also include for how many there was no consequence)?

Of each of the attacks as outlined, a full investigation was undertaken with the classification based on the evidential efficiency to meet the requirements of prosecution. Where possible, the position of the council would be to prosecute where necessary and elevate to a higher classification if there were a potential breach.

The 2022 incident Council were unable to prosecute on the basis that the police were unwilling to assist with a search and seizure warrant.
